Scargill₉₈ must obey courts'

Sir Michael Havers, Attorney General, predicted yesterday that Mr Arthur Scargill and the National Union of Mineworkers would be brought to heel by the High Court.

He said in a BBC radio interview on *The World The Weekend:* "Ultimately, a court order has to be obeyed". He added: "The judges, in my view, will ensure that the proper orders of the court are ob-served".

Sir Michael emphasised that Wednesday's resumed contempt proceedings, adjourned by Mr Justice Nicholls last Wednesday so that Mr Scargill could reconsider his defiance of the court, had nothing to do with either Conservative legislation or with Mr MacGregor, chairman of the National Coal Board.

He said: "It is two Yorkshire miners saying that their union is breaking the rules".

The Government would have to stand on the sidelines because contempt proceeding were entirely out of minister's hands. But Sir Michael said that the judge had a number of options open to him.

"It may well be that the first course will be a very substantial fine, and then there may be

sequestration.'
